

Lake Winnipeg is the third largest wholly Canadian lake and the twelfth largest fresh water lake in the world. With an area of almost 9,500 square miles it is larger than Lake Ontario and almost as large as Lake Erie. The province of Prince Edward Island would fit comfortably into its northern end.

Water enters the lake via three main river systems. The Winnipeg River accounts for about 39% of the inflow and drains the area east to within a few miles of Lake Superior. The Saskatchewan River system, draining almost the entire Canadian prairie region, accounts for about 32% of Lake Winnipeg's water. Only 6% enters from the Red River while the remaining 23% is fed by smaller rivers like the Berens, Poplar, Pigeon, Bloodvein and Manigotagan. The lake's drainage basin totals an impressive 370,000 square miles.


Primary cause for the seasonal fluctuations in the lake's level is the shallow and restricted outlet at the north end through Playgreen Lake. When the total flow of the rivers that feed into the lake exceeds the outflow from the lake and losses through evaporation from its surface, the level of the lake rises. This situation may be aggravated by excessive precipitation in the entire area of the basin draining into the lake. Over a period of years of continuing heavy precipitation, a build up of water may occur which will cause unusually high lake levels such as happened in 1966. In order to prevent this from recurring it is necessary to enlarge the outlet channels so that water can escape at least as fast as it enters the lake. How this will be done and how the escaping water will be put to work will be explained in subsequent messages.



A pen name and familiar signature to many faithful readers of the Herald was that of Elinor Ivanoff, who for many years contributed articles that were informative, exciting, historical and witty to our paper.

Mrs. Ivanoff was the Editor in 1966 and 1967. Between the years 1956 and 1971 she contributed numerous articles that ranged from nature studies such as "Mushrooms", "Gardens" and "Thunderstorms" to historical research about Victoria Beach. "Golden Jubilee Victoria Beach 50 Years", 1966, was an indication of how much she loved and cared about this area. "Walks", "Hidden Lake", "Elk Island", "Looking Back", "The Early Settlers", to name a few, she wrote to describe the interest and beauty of the area. Did you know that:

We are experiencing excessive erosion on our banks? That in many places on King Edward and Patricia banks the erosion is almost up to the private property line? You may and can help us by using municipal steps. Please keep your children

down off the banks. We have passed the point of no return so cannot have children and adults digging and sliding on the banks.

We had three volunteers in answer to the concerned citizen's VOICE in the Herald who were willing to take the flag down at sundown. Until we can get additional flags, the flag will fly as mounted, for unfortunately my experience is that flags disappear in broad daylight.

We have many complaints about dogs. Dogs on the beach without leashes; dogs left in cottages when families are at the beach, who whine and howl, disturbing those vacationers who no longer can go to the beach; dogs roaming at large through the resort areas frightening little ones. 



Manitoba is not blessed with an abundance of energy resources. With no coal or natural gas and only a modest amount of oil, our major energy source is water power. Last year about 95% of the electricity produced in Manitoba came from hydro-electric plants on the Winnipeg, Saskatchewan and Nelson rivers. The Nelson, with development scarcely begun, is already supplying about one-third of Manitoba's electricity. Within a few years we will be dependent on it for about 90% of our electrical energy.

The Nelson is Manitoba's own river. It flows 410 miles north from its source, Lake Winnipeg and descends 712 feet to where it enters Hudson Bay. It's a mighty river whose flow on occasion has been as much as 160 times greater than that of the Red River. Along its lower reaches it affords a number of excellent sites for the generation of electricity.

Kettle and Kelsey sites, now partially in service, are the first power developments on the river. Four more sites below Kettle will be developed within the next fifteen years. The Nelson, regulated at its source and augmented with water diverted from the Churchill River has power potential almost sufficient to see us into the 21st century.

Water power is especially valuable because it is a renewable resource. As long as the snow and rain falls and the sun shines there will be water in our rivers. By extracting the potential energy from the flowing water and converting it to electricity we are putting this great natural resource to work for the good of all Manitoba.

In subsequent messages we will describe some of the problems associated with harnessing the Nelson and how Your Hydro proposes to meet them.
