### STORM HITS VICTORIA BEACH

The week end of July 26th to 28th saw the arrival of the season's first sustained period of high wind. The results unfortunately confirmed the accuracy of many predictions made about the devastating effects of the combination of this year's extraordinarily high water level with a strong wind from the north or north west.

Damage to the shoreline has been extensive. All beaches have suffered severe erosion; only two sets of stairs down to the beaches are still in existence, and they are not safe for use. The worst damage appears to have occurred along King Edward and Alexandra Beaches; some fifty trees have fallen into the lake, and thirty-five feet of bank has, in places, fallen into the lake. In many places the footpath above the beach has disappeared altogether. Some buildings are now as close as twenty feet to the new shoreline. Patricia beach, although more sheltered, was also severely damaged. The scouring action of the waves undercut great portions of the bank, and washed away two sets of stairs.

The Clubhouse was threatened by total inundation as early as Friday evening. Many volunteers pitched in, and a stout sandbag wall was built which proved, with occasional reinforcement, to be strong enough to withstand the waves. Pier road was flooded in places, and a number of washouts were averted by sandbagging. The pier itself took a heavy pounding; at one point the waves were washing right over it without breaking. Heavy boulders have been forced up on to the deck of the pier itself by the action of the waves.

Municipal services were affected by the storm. The water supply was put out of action early Saturday afternoon by damage to the inlet pipe in the lake. The waves were pounding the pump house itself, but the foundations appear to have held. Electricity was interrupted briefly on Saturday and Sunday, but service was quickly restored.

The Herald, on behalf of the Victoria Beach Club, sends a warm thank you to all the youngsters who pitched in with the sandbagging to save the clubhouse. Moments of urgency seem to be able to bring out the best in many of us. A few aberrant

specimens, however, fail to respond. We think, for example, of those pathetic souls who in a display of egotistical bravura showed their disregard for their own safety and their contempt for that of others by ignoring posted warnings and walking up and down damaged steps and cliffs. We wonder how they will amuse themselves once the winds have died down.

There is little doubt that the damage which can be undone will take many weeks. The municipal council and employees will have their hands full for some time. The question everyone is asking, of course, is how much Manitoba Hydro is responsible for the high water level this year. Rumours of coffer dams and sunken barges abound. Statements by Hydro officials and politicians have failed to convince many of us that the water levels are exclusively or even preponderantly the result of natural phenomena. The promises made for the future about controlling the level of the lake will be remembered for a long time. For the present, all residents of Victoria Beach will expect the Municipal Council to make the most pressing requests of the Provincial Government for compensation to those permanent residents and cottage owners who have suffered as a result of the storm that everyone knew was coming.

### GOLF

The third annual Orange Blossom Open was held Friday, July 19 at the lush Victoria Beach Golf and Country Club.

The day was perfect for golf and the all star field took advantage of conditions to record many fine shots. The only blemish on an otherwise smoothly run event was an unpleasant incident on the eleventh green which, fortunately, was quickly rectified.

This year's winner of the coveted Tang Trophy for low net was Dick Archer who, despite considerable dispute, was declared champ after a tense, tie breaking putt-off. Low gross was carded by Terry Angus which gross low event went to Streaker Duke.

**EDITORIAL**

It is time again for our annual complaint about dogs on the beaches. We know that you have heard it all before, that you are probably sick and tired of the subject, but we have been getting a large number of verbal requests to "put something in the Herald about those dogs". We know that pet owners have a problem: many of them feel that their dog is a member of the family and should enjoy all the rights and privileges pertaining to that status. Personally, we don't subscribe to that notion, chiefly because extending it to some logical conclusions can be pretty hilarious. But what do you do with your dog, when you are down at the beach? Lock him in the cottage, so that he howls to high heaven and wakens every napping toddler for blocks around? Chain him in the yard? Maybe. Take him for a long walk, get him all tuckered out, so that he'll sleep while you're swimming? Who knows? There must be some solution, because not everybody's dog runs loose on the beach, although there are days when we wonder. Our guess is that half the people here have a dog, so this editorial may lose us a few friends; we hope not, but if it does, so be it. We know that many of the complaints we have heard, have come from dog owners, so perhaps we will avoid social ostracization after all. We would like, once again, to remind all Herald readers that a municipal bylaw forbids dogs to be on the beach unless on a leash. Tearing down the signs posted to that effect, as some have done, doesn't alter the fact a bit. Frankly we would have hoped that with so little beach available this year, dogs would be kept off the beaches altogether, but that may be asking too much, and we don't want to be unreasonable. We do object strongly however to the kind of incident we witnessed the other day. Two large black labrador dogs started chasing each other right in the middle of the "splashers" swimming lesson. These youngsters, who were trying to cope with the notion of going into the water for the first time to swim, were harrassed and bothered by these dogs, until finally, one child was knocked flat, face down into the water. Bystanders managed to chase the dogs off, but it should never have happened.

I don't think that anybody really wants to have a Beach Patrol, to ticket errant dogs, (and perhaps enforce the liquor act as well,) on the beaches. It may have to come to that, though, unless the few dog owners, who spoil it for everybody, smarten up.

**POLICE STORY**

This week, Mr. Robert Jonsson, Municipal Supervisor and Police Constable provided us with some interesting details about the enforcement of the law at Victoria Beach. The evidence seems to show that, although the number of incidents reported to the Police office is approximately the same as for the equivalent period last year, there have been fewer serious offences this year.

In the period June 18th through July 16th, 1974, 63 incidents were reported, whereas 67 were reported between June 20th and July 16th, 1973. Statistics for individual offences are as follows: (the figure for 1973 is shown for comparison, in brackets).

Theft - 6 (11); Lost & Found - 25 (25); Mischief, wilful damage - 9 (0); Breaking, entering - 0 (5); Breaking & entering with intent - 0 (8); Attempted breaking & entering - 0 (1); Violations of Municipal traffic bylaw (driving in the Beach area without a permit) - 13 (25); Various Highway Traffic Act offences - 4 (4); Offences against the Liquor Act - 1 (15); Total Offences - 58 (84). An "incident" may involve a number of offences, hence the discrepancy in the totals quoted above.

The Lost & Found service causes some problems for Mr. Jonsson. - he is, at the moment of writing, looking after a siamese cat, hoping that the owners will claim it. It is not the same cat as one reported missing earlier. It seems that owners frequently neglect to inform the police office when things "go missing", there are still four bicycles on hand from last year to join the three unclaimed ones this year. Anybody lose a bike? The recovery rate for stolen bicycles at Victoria Beach is about 50%, which is considerably higher than that for a well-known large urban centre about 65 miles away. It is clear that it pays

to report lossess; it also pays to report incidents of damage and vandalism. Two youths who broke into a number of cars in the parking lot on July 6th were apprehended, the same night, by R.C.M.P. near Pine Falls, and a number of stolen items were recovered. The Police office, opposite the entrance to the parking lot, is open 10 a.m. to 12 noon, and 3:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m., seven days a week; on Friday and Saturday it is also open in the evening from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m.

Although Victoria Beachers are generally a law-abiding lot, it seems that some of us do slip up, now and again. Would you believe speeding? Yes! The 15 m.p.h. speed limit in the municipality applies to bicycles as well as motor vehicles, and maybe even to those early morning joggers too! There have been reports of excessive speed by cyclists, particularly on Birch Avenue the road between the store and the bakeshop. And don't forget the stop sign at the entrance to the Beach!

Pedestrians also cause some minor traffic problems. Please - everybody stand on the same side of the road to let a car pass; it is very difficult for the driver if he has to watch children, for example, on both sides of his car at the same time.

A reminder, to close this report, that discarded building materials, shingles, tarpaper, etc., must be removed by the property owner. They will not be removed by the brush collection truck. So please! Don't dump your old shingles on somebody else's brush pile, have someone cart them away.
