### PROTECTIVE SERVICES

This budgetary area includes POLICE (\$18,800) FLOOD CONTROL (\$12,000) FIRE (\$3,900) and PREDATOR CONTROL (\$300). The \$35,000 total is up nine percent from 1975.

FLOOD CONTROL is an item that never appeared in Municipal budgets prior to 1974 and hopefully will not be required to appear again after this year. During the 18-month period May, 1974 to October, 1975 the Municipality expended some \$300,000 on emergency protective works and their maintenance. We have recovered all but \$14,000 under various Provincial grant formulas. These works were carried out in seven areas of the Municipality and while most were temporary in nature, some were permanent. Included in the latter was the raising of Pier Road and constructing a buttress to the north of PTH 59 from Albert Beach to Wanasing to protect the highway from the waters of Traverse Bay. Other access roads, such as Park Avenue and its easterly extension, were raised and suitable culverts and flood-gates installed. Overall the Municipality has benefited to a considerably greater degree than its \$14,000 investment.

For this year we have budgeted \$12,000 for Flood Control with off-setting Provincial grants of \$10,500 and thus a net cost to the Municipality of \$1,500. However the budget was struck prior to our receiving advice from the Provincial Water Resources Department to the effect that all uncompleted Flood Control works, including the removal of temporary dykes, must be completed by this Fall in order to qualify for grants. As most of our dyking system is temporary (sandbags), we are faced with a large job, and major expense, between August and October. Fortunately however the Province will reimburse us 100 percent for monies expended for removal of temporary dykes and thus this year's net expenditures should not be affected. Council will make final decisions on what works are to be carried out at its meeting of July 20th. Mr. Walter Whyte will be in charge of the operation.

Mr. Robert Jonsson is in charge of all three remaining areas of Protective Services, being Police, Fire, and Predator Control. For those readers unfamiliar with the Jonsson family, Robert's mother Freda moved to the Beach with her family in 1911, she then being Freda Ateah. His father was a prominent area contractor and at the time of his decease served as Municipal Justice of the Peace.

Robert was born and educated at the Beach and St. John's College, and following war-time service in the Armed Forces, joined the R.C.M.P. from which he retired in 1966 after 20 years service. He was appointed Municipal Constable in 1971,

and is the only person to have held this position on a year-round, full-time basis. We are indeed fortunate to have the services of someone of his knowledge.

In addition to police work, Mr. Jonsson also serves as a competent Fire Chief, Building Inspector, and Predator Control Officer, as well as being in charge of the office located to the north of the Parking lot office.

**NOTE** — In my report to taxpayers I referred to this office as a Police and local Municipal office. It would have been more correct to have said Police and local Municipal Information office as we have only one Municipal office, and that located in Winnipeg. The local office cannot transact such business as the payment of taxes, etc.

The Police budget (\$18,800) does not include a major item, auto depreciation. This is presently significant as I will shortly be asking Council to consider trading-in the present vehicle for a station-wagon, one that will accommodate a stretcher and oxygen equipment. Emergency hospital trips have increased significantly and with more people, particularly retired folk, arriving at the Beach in early Spring and staying to late Fall, this service should be provided.

The \$18,800 police budget includes Robert's annual salary, pension, and other benefits, the wages and benefits of a part-time assistant, Mr. Harold Martin, and those of a person to staff the office for approximately 320 hours each summer, plus patrol car expenses of \$2,650. Other included expenses are telephone, hydro, incidental office expenses, uniforms, vehicular permits, etc. Due to an increasing demand for policing services, I expect that our budget is inadequate. To this end I have been corresponding with the Attorney-General in the hopes of some Provincial financial assistance. Our Municipality falls within the area policed by the Powerview detachment of the R.C.M.P. which obviously places us somewhat remote from their headquarters, particularly as their busy season coincides with ours. In fact it appears that our Municipal police provides greater service to the Provincial force through assisting in emergencies outside our boundaries, than is afforded us through the Powerview headquarters.

The summer season places great demand upon Robert Jonsson's time, frequently unreasonable demands. While he appreciates that long summer hours find some compensation in much less arduous winter routines, he nevertheless must have time for sleep and meals, and some relaxation with wife and family, albeit catch-as-catch-can.

We can all help. This is particularly true in the case of reporting the license numbers of unauthorized or speeding vehicles, or the ownership of dogs unleashed on the Beach. The latter has been a perennial complaint since the Municipality's incorporation. More frequent Police foot-patrol of the

beaches is often suggested as an answer but this is costly and has not proven successful in the past. Others have suggested a total ban on animals on the beaches between certain day-time hours. Many reject this solution, saying that this would mean leaving the family pooch locked-up in the cottage, and its resultant howling would be an even greater nuisance. If we must increase Beach foot-patrols solely because of irresponsible dog owners, than I personally believe the present \$10 fine should be greatly increased.

Our voluntary 16-man Fire Department under Chief Jonsson and Deputy Bert Traimor has been the recipient of a considerable amount of new fire-fighting and safety equipment. Communications have also been improved so that when you dial FIRE at 2224, the phone rings simultaneously at five locations. During the summer season one of these phones is located at the Parking lot office which is staffed 24-hours a day. This phone will be moved to my home when the parking lot is closed and an arrangement made to insure that someone will be available at all times to answer one of the five emergency fire phones.

Most rate-payers residing in the main cottage subdivision are aware of the fire warning siren at the Water Tower on 8th Avenue. This system was installed before public telephones were generally available throughout the Municipality and prior to the "conference-type" line for answering Fire calls. We would prefer citizens to phone fire calls rather than sound the general alarm from the Water Tower. The general alarm will be left in place to be sounded at the discretion of the Fire Department to warn citizens of the possibility of a general conflagration or to call for additional assistance. Further details regarding Fire procedures will be publicized soon. Our dilapidated party-line telephone system at the Beach is confusing to many City-dwellers. If you are calling from a Beach-pay-phone, first

dial your focal number and wait until someone answers, then immediately drop in five cents otherwise the answering party will not be able to hear you. However if calling an emergency number you need not put in the nickel. Simply dial '0' for the Operator and ask her to connect you with the Victoria Beach Fire, Police, or Doctor.

Nowadays Predator Control is concerned mainly with the reduction of our skunk population, though rats, wolves, and bears have also been of concern this past year. In 1975 bounties were paid on 108 skunks and one bear. Hundreds of rats were eradicated at our disposal grounds by a private contractor.
