VICTORIA BEACH — The Best Summer Resort in Canada

"A friend of mine said to me early last May, over lunch, "I am going to be at Victoria Beach for about 10 days in August. I have not been to that beach, and I am not looking forward to it. I hate beaches."

I met him on his third day here at the beach and he promptly asked me to help him find a lot to build on "What changed your mind, so fast?" I asked. "The freedom from cars, and the 'country lanes' was his immediate reply."

A week later he was still enlarging on his reasons for coming to love this beach. I asked him if he had any complaints. The taxes, trucks and other vehicles "wouldn't it be wonderful to get rid of even these vehicles as necessary as I admit some of them are?"

In our discussions during golf, during visits, even cycling jaunts, we talked about the beach. I asked him to get down to basics. What is it he really looks for in a summer resort? Without hesitation he said repeatedly, "Peace and quiet first, eye-filling lovely nature second, but not far behind, and a golf course."

"Do you know what would happen if the driving restriction were ever lifted?" he asked me. Although I knew the answer, I said nothing and let him fill me in with the details. "First people would complain of the dust, and the dangers in walking and cycling and the dangers in driving in passing, as seen on the narrow 'country lanes'. Then the request would be for asphalt surfacing, for straightening and widening the roads. Gone would be these lovely 'country lanes' intended for a slow pace and for enjoying the trees and birds and the architecture. There would be a great increase in taxes to cover roads, signs and police surveillance. Gone would be the peace and quiet. Gone the naturalness."

The man saying all this is not my age, no senior citizen him, he is a man of thirty odd years who has lived in or visited most other provinces.

I believe he hit the proverbial nail on the head. Basic to the glories of our wonderful resort, to that precious peace and quiet, is the restriction on motor vehicles. Inconvenient as it may be at times, the inconvenience is but of the moment, the glories fill all the other hours.

How do we hold on to what we've got? Perhaps we have to give on the one hand to gain on the other. Perhaps we have to have the bakeshop and store rebuilt at the parking lot and allow no permit vehicles beyond the post office. That would mean no vehicles to the ball park. The only vehicles necessary in the restricted area would be the limited number of taxis, the major deliveries, and the municipal service trucks. Permits would still be granted but only on limited grounds such as medical reasons for local residents. There is really no reason why local residents should not walk to the ball park and club house. Summer residents do. Both pay taxes on the same basis.

The mode of traffic control could be two gates, one at the junction of Pine and Centre, one on David Road. Passage could easily be left for pedestrians and cyclists.

Appreciate the difficulty a law enforcement officer has. If he is too rigid, he is looked upon as being unhuman, if he is too lax he will find people do not respect the law. To give him support the municipal council can give him guidelines so that he does not have to decide all infractions himself.

The first priority, I would say is the fire ordinance. No open fires. We have recently heard there were two incidents of fire this spring, either of which could have developed into a serious forest fire that could have destroyed all our cottages. In both cases local residents used bad judgement and started grass fires. No charges were laid. The local council can relieve the enforcement officer of this decision and order a charge to be laid everytime such incidents occur.


Besides the control of motor vehicles in a stricter way, another behaviour that could be diminished through guidelines set by the council is that of the drinking of beer in public places. I refer to the pier and fishermen, and to Club House beach. Day-picnickers on weekends are usually involved in these two places but a worse one is the beer drinking at the ball park.

In this regard it perhaps needs to be said, as most adults know, respect for the law is the basis of a healthy society and the respect is developed through education of the young by parents, and through reasonable enforcements. When young people witness adults breaking the law with no seeming fear of being stopped they too learn to disregard the law. Then we complain of vandalism, or whatever.

The guidelines given by the council to the enforcement officer could be to confiscate and charge each time with no first warning. The first warning can be on a poster at the parking lot.

Aside from these issues and while I have pen in hand, I would like to say the election of councillor should be the third week in August. For myself I find I am so pre-occupied with settling in that the first fortnight of July has gone before I am into the Victoria Beach sound and have a knowledge of what is happening. I even missed the first meeting, July 15, not having seen the posters, and finding no mention of it in the Herald.

SAFETY LIFE LINE (King Edward Beach)

Over the years there have been many near drownings and unfortunately deaths from accidental drownings at Victoria Beach. A large percentage of these accidents have occurred at King Edward Beach where the shoreline forms a corner of the Victoria Beach lthmus. For years there has been a large sign warning bathers not to enter the water when it is rough. Nevertheless, bathers have found themselves in difficulty and would-be rescuers have exhausted themselves, battling with the undertow when a combination of circumstances have contrived to make this beach unsafe. These circumstances usually begin with a prevailing North or Northwest wind which, playing on the surface of 400 miles of water stretching to the north, raises the level of the lake at this southern location. Elk Island breaks the wind and protects the channel which separates it from Victoria Beach and provides an escape for the build-up of water and a current running north-east is created flowing into the mouth of Traverse Bay. This current is fed by an undertow which swirls around the King Edward corner. The Safety Life Line is placed on the point to provide a means of coping with this current for those who venture in despite warnings on these exceptional days. Children should be taught not to tamper with the Nylon Safety Line.
