The main event in those days was to meet the daily train at noon, where we hoped to see our friends and tried to judge our creditors. When the engine turned the corner at Park Avenue, the engineer blew his whistle and there was always a sort of competition between our son and me as to what would be the number of the engine as we could tell according to the pitch of the whistle. When I said it sounds like No. 7201, our son would look disdainfully at me and say "Oh no, don't be stupid, it is No. 7204, and he was always right. So he became a Ph D and I a Mus Doc. It somehow does not make sense.

We had to take the train to get here and always brought along a bridge table, for everybody knew everybody else and it was easy to get two more players for a game of cards. We took bridge very seriously and even when the train stopped at Grand Beach or Grand Marais, we were so engrossed in our playing, that we hardly ever looked out of the window to feast our eyes on the blubbery torsions who paraded on the boardwalk in the skimpiest of coverage.

Life was quieter those days. We all had radios, but kept them indoors and toned them down. Today people open all their doors and windows, or even take them outside to the picnic table, so as not to miss one note of the screeching drivel emanating from those machines. In order not to miss anything from a program of rock-and-roll and other inanities, people even carry their radios down to the beach, to inflict that rot on the people who go there for peace and quietness.

As I came up from Patricia Beach the other day, three teenagers came down the steps, brandishing a portable radio blaring out the usual filth. They put the thing down and let it blare away while they went to have a dip in the lake, in the meantime annoying all people in the neighborhood. Then on Patricia Road two more girls came walking down, also with a blaring radio. I realize that those people need something to fill their empty heads, and any kind of noise will do, but Victoria Beach is not the place to do it.

One of the highlights those days was the Sunday morning Church Service in the Club House. There, protestants and demonstrators gathered for an hour of worship, and with the Lake as a background, the Service was much more effective than in the most elaborate city Church edifice. The piano had no front or top. Most of the isories on the keys were missing or broken and the few strings that were left did not always synchronize, but the hymns sounded as if they were played on a Steinway Grand. The preachers arrived without their togas and finery and often came in Bermuda shorts, depending on the shape of their legs.

The informality was refreshing and the average Service often left a greater impression on the congregation than many a learned dissertation. They were something really wonderful to look back to. After coming here for some 40-plus years in July and August, it has become part of my life and when September rolls along, I am already making plans for what to do in Victoria Beach the following summer. As long as we have something to look forward to life shall remain as with a while, and I hope to be back here for many more summers to come.

## AROUND AND ABOUT WITH THE EDITOR

Visited Saults & Pollard Rank Note Company, premises on Buffalo Place. And presto the Herald was born again! Now, I remember when the typesetter worked upside down, or was at backwards, setting heavy type into a frame. That was man's job. Now a pretty girl has the heaviest work in reading my script. She types on the keyboard of a word-processor, watches the message come up on a I.V. screen, pushes a button or two to delete a word or a line, or to open up for additional lines or just to elongate or reduce the dimensions of the paragraph. I had gone to the plant to have some changes made, feeling embarrassed to put them all in such feeble voice all had been through the processor and into print-outs. No problem, they said, putting the tape back into the machine and giving it a few directions. Such magic! The next stage is the cutting of individual items and the fastening to a plastic template the size of the Herald open. Once the make-up is complete, it is photographed and the pieces go to the press. ## RESCUE BREATHING:

1. Open airway by lifting neck with one hand and tilting the head back with the other hand.
2. Pinch nostrils to prevent air leakage. Maintain open airway by keeping the neck elevated.
3. Seal your mouth over victim's mouth. Blow in four quick breaths. The victim's chest should rise.
4. Remove mouth. Release nostrils. Listen for air escaping from lungs. Watch for chest to fall.

Perform a regular breathing cycle of 12 to 15 times a minute to breath every 5 seconds. Continue until medical help arrives or breathing is restored.

## EDITORIAL

The Reeve mentioned in his letter to the Herald, July 9, that the two buildings, the store and bakery are in such poor structural condition they cannot be used much longer. On the wintering grounds its staple food is waste corn garnered from the harvested fields. The crow arrives on its northern nesting grounds in early March where its return is welcomed as a harbinger of spring.
