Joanne Jaeger and Kim Wiebe are two very talented and attractive young ladies who just happen to be Victoria Beach's summer swimming instructors.

Joanne and Kim along with Karen Yaeger and Laura McInnes provide the dedication and expertise that motivates somewhere between 225 and 250 youngsters and adults to attend their lessons each week. The swimming program is under the very capable sponsorship of Janet Sampson, 449 Sunset. The swimming program runs from June 30 through to August 15, 1986, and is one of the many activities sponsored by the Victoria Beach Club.

Joanne has been with the swimming program for five years, working up from teaching Minnows her first year to four years of general instruction. She is in her second year as head instructor.

A fourth year Education student at the University of Manitoba, Joanne has a special interest in teaching English, Second Language and working with hearing impaired children. German is her second language and she speaks it quite fluently.

A keen windsurfer, Joanne loves swimming and travelling. She has just finished a five-week stint in Europe (Germany) where she worked in May and June for the Bayer Pharmaceutical Company.

If anything, Joanne Jaeger is an overqualified swimming instructor. Here are a few of her credentials: Swimming Instructor; C.P.R. Instructor; Examiner; National Life Guard Service; member of the Council of Aquatic Emergency Care.

Kim Wiebe is in her third year with the swimming program. Her first year was spent working with Minnows and the other two as an instructor. Kim summers at Albert Beach and bikes back and forth each day, getting in her morning exercise before teaching.

Kim is in her second year in Science at the University of Manitoba and will enter Medicine next year. She spent part of the winter working for the Learned Societies and ran their registration desk at the U. of M. for the Society's 16-day conference in May and June of this year.

Kim is a highly qualified instructor too. She has her Instructor's, Nation Life Guard, C.P.R., and her Basic Rescuer.

Joanne and Kim, working with Karen and Laura, who teach Minnows (3-5 years of age), each put in somewhere in the vicinity of 35-40 hours a week. Besides teaching swimming, they are also teaching Aquasizes (exercises in the water) each Tuesday and Thursday and a Synchronized Swimming Program and a Stroke Correction Program Monday, Wednesday, and Friday.

Sounds like a busy schedule, doesn't it? Well, it is. Besides all this they also help out at special events such as Beach Events and Sports Day and most other extra-curricular things.

Joanne and Kim, when asked about how they felt about the beach and their work, eagerly responded, "It's a perfect job!" Kim looks forward each year to her summer work. Joanne loves the area, the uniqueness of the beach, no cars, and the atmosphere of a quiet recreational community.

Parents and children of Victoria Beach are indeed fortunate to have had the services of these two most able people. Because they are going on with what looks like most promising futures for themselves, they will probably not be back with us next year.

Kim is going to travel next year to Australia and India before she resumes her studies. Joanne is planning to marry James Whitlaw whom she met here three years ago (while teaching swimming) and find a job teaching somewhere in the province. Karen Jaeger (Joanne's sister) and Laura McInnes, who by the way, both have their Swimming Instructors, are patiently waiting in the wings in the meanwhile.

I asked them what they did on Sundays and the few other hours each day when they were not feverishly working teaching kids and adults.

"Oh, we like to swim!" they responded.

Thanks girls, we all owe you a lot for your dedication to duty and the capable manner in which you handled your responsibilities. Great future!


Players who won trophies in the 1985 tournament are requested to return them prior to the tournament. You may leave your trophy with Dave Drybrough at 302-8th Ave.

New Water Plant Scheduled To Open in September

That spanking new building going up on Highway 59 just this side of Hillside Road is destined to be the home of the Trainor Artesian Water Company Limited and within a few months will be offering employment to several people from the area.

It's hard for Manitobans to visualize anyone selling and bottling water for sale but it's big business in many parts of Canada and especially the United States. Bert Trainor is an enterprising person and visualized a certain amount of prosperity in the water bottling business. Not a person afraid to take a chance on a business venture, Bert foresees a bright future for his pet project.

The building which will house his plant is of frame construction with a sheet metal exterior and is 40 feet by 80 feet by 16 feet in size. Beside the water bottling plant, it will contain a staff room, office and additional space. The building will be well insulated and should be a show place along the highway. The area will be fully landscaped and three flag poles will help to identify it. The area in front of the building will be lit up at night and a special water fountain will add to its attractive looks.

At first the water will be packaged in four and ten litre plastic containers. A future stage could lead to a full bottling line when need and demand are there. After a study done by C. E. Whyte of Opportunity West Development Limited called the *Study to Determine the Economic Feasibility of a Carbonated Bottled Water Manufacturing Plant at Hillside Beach, Manitoba*, Mr. Trainor is confident about its future.

The plant will bottle just natural artesian water for now but according to Mr. Trainor, there is a good market for carbonated water too. Before making final decisions to go ahead with the business the water underwent chemical analysis by the Manitoba Health Department and the Consumers Corporation and rated very high in water quality.

The immediate market for the natural water will be the area encompassed between Winnipeg and Regina. Future markets could be much of the rest of Canada and of course the United States and the areas around Minneapolis and Chicago in particular.

The plant will produce a semi-truck load a day: 2000 - 10 litre plastic containers of artesian water. Local Winnipeg large food store chains will be the first to carry the water for consumer purchase.

The plant will be a boon to the area, too, offering some much needed employment to local residents. To start six people, at least half of which would be female, will work there at various jobs like secretary, labelling, rinsing, filling, capping, and shrink wrapping.

One of the workers will be a working foreman. All will work a 40 hour week and will be employed throughout the year on a full time basis.

Bert Trainor feels that when the water bottling business grows and develops into a full line of carbonated, flavored water the number of people employed could easily double. This, of course, was one reason for building a sizeable and attractive working place.

Bert's attitude about this new enterprise for the beach area is an easy one to follow. "I try, whenever I do anything, to do my best." He believes in doing things the right way and his new natural water bottling plant has certainly been that. Bert Trainor is a man with ideas and a credit to our community.

When will the plant open, you say? The product should be ready and on the market by the end of September, 1986. What about the natural artesian water so many of us stop for and enjoy drinking? That won't change — we'll enjoy drinking it for a long, long time and for free!

Council Corner

Over the past year and more particularly this spring and summer, it has become very obvious that some cottagers have become very careless with their garbage. Council therefore wishes to once again clarify our garbage disposal system.

In order to keep our resort beautiful and to reduce litter, there are two basic rules that should be observed by all:

1. Garbage is not to be left on the front street at any time.
2. Brush, leaves and appliances should not be put out on the street between June 21 and Labour Day. Collection of this material only occurs before June 21 and after October 1. Keep them on your property until after Labour Day.

From the latter part of June and until Friday after Labour Day, garbage should be placed in SECURE containers, preferably cans with lids, at a convenient place at the front, side or rear of your property. The refuse contractor will pick it up there in accordance with his contract. If you wish to help the contractor, you may move it near to the street on the day of the pickup.

In some cases garbage is being put out on the street in plastic bags at the end of a weekend. Plastic bags are easy targets for dogs and skunks, and the mess resulting is very unsightly and unless the garbage is in a secure container, the contractor does not have to remove it.

Before the residential weekly pickup starts in June and after it ends in early September, containers in convenient locations, are provided at each subdivision, and residents must take their garbage to these containers.

If you leave it on the street after Labour Day, it does not get picked up and a messy street results.

Owners are asked to notify renters regarding garbage pickup or refer them to the "Information for Residents" card distributed to each residence at the beginning of the summer.

Parking

There are no reserved parking spots in the parking lot. Bicycles placed in parking spots do not in any way act as a reservation for any particular parking space. If you remove your car even for a short time, that space then becomes open to the first person who wishes to use it. The practice of placing bicycles or other articles in a parking space to reserve it is not acceptable and should be discontinued.

Crows

The numbers and noise of crows was discussed at the open meeting of council on July 15.

One suggestion was that an organized crow shoot be held in early April of 1987. Anyone interested in taking part is asked to leave his or her name and phone number with the municipal secretary treasurer at 943-1070. We will also consider paying a bounty for crows eggs in 1987.

Water System

Since no written objections to the improvements to the water system, which have been advertised, have been received, Council expects to give first reading to the proposed debenture bylaw at the meeting at the Sports Club on July 21 at 11:00 a.m. after which the proposal will be followed up as advertised.









Aunt Vickie's Recipe Corner
What a week it has been for picking blueberries, raspberries, and Saskatoons and how delicious they are, especially when you pick them yourself.
I know that many of you enjoyed Allison Bloomer's recipe for Quick Pineapple Upside-Down Dessert and we again thank Allison for sending it in to Aunt Vickie. This week I would like to share with you a recipe for Blueberry Crisp and Fool-Proof Pastry. Here's hoping they bring you a mouth-watering experience

Blueberry Crisp
Place in 1-1/2 quart greased baking dish
4 cups fresh blueberries (Victoria Beach ones)
Sprinkle with
1/2 cups granulated sugar
2 tsp. lemon juice
Cream 4 tbsps. butter or margarine. Gradually cream in 3/4 cup brown sugar. Mix in 1/2 cups flour. Rub to a crumbly mixture. Spread crumbs over the top of the fruit. Bake in oven at 350° for about 40 minutes. Six servings.

Fool-Proof Pastry (Mar Desmet)
Mix together:
1 lb. lard, softened
6 cups of sifted flour
2 tsp. salt
Stir until fat is thoroughly mixed in.
Mix together and chill:
1 beaten egg
2 tbsps. vinegar
3/4 cup cold water
Stir all at once into flour mixture. Form into a loaf and keep in a plastic bag or waxed paper in the refrigerator until needed.

Foam is used as the filling in almost all cushions, seat & back, in furniture today new or re-upholstered. It's also the main cushioning agent used for padding in all other areas: arms, edges, etc. Therefore the quality of foam used will determine to a great extent the comfort, appearance & longevity.

Quality foam is simply determined by density. Density does not determine the compression (softness or firmness) of the cushion but does determine the resiliency — its ability to rebound.

There are two main types of foam, polyurethane and latex rubber. Polyurethane foams range in density from 1.0 p.c.f. (lb. per cubic ft.) to 3.0 p.c.f. Latex rubber foams range in density from 4.0-4.5 p.c.f. A foam with a density of 3.0-4.5 p.c.f. is recommended for best seating results.
