Aunt Vickie's Cookery Column

STRAWBERRY CHEESECAKE

- 1 1/2 cups graham wafer crumbs
- 1/4 cup melted margarine
- 2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
- 1/2 cup cold water
- 500 grams low fat Quark cheese
- 1 tbsp. lemon juice
- 1 tsp. almond flavoring
- 1/2 cup white sugar
- 1 envelope whipped topping mix
- 1/2 cup milk
- 2 cups strawberries (fresh or frozen without sugar) pureed

Combine graham crumbs and margarine and press into bottom of 9 inch springform pan. Chill. Soften gelatin in water, and heat until gelatin is dissolved. Cool slightly. In large mixer bowl, on medium speed cream the cheese until it is light and fluffy. Add sugar and continue beating until blended. Gradually add gelatin, lemon juice, flavoring and pureed strawberries, continue mixing until well blended.

In small mixer bowl whip the topping mix and milk according to package instructions. Fold into cheese mixture. Pour over chilled crust and chill until firm (overnight). Garnish with additional whipped topping and strawberries if desired. Makes 10-12 servings.

N.B. Substitute Blueberries or Raspberries for the Strawberries. You may also substitute low fat Ricotta cheese or yogurt cheese for the Quark cheese.

AUTUMN CHEESECAKE

- 1 cup graham cracker crumbs
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 cup margarine, melted
- Combine crumbs, sugar, cinnamon and margarine; press onto bottom of 9-inch springform pan. Bake at 350°, 10 minutes.
- 2 - 8 ounce packages Cream Cheese, softened
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Combine cream cheese and sugar, mixing at medium speed on electric mixer until well blended. Add eggs, one at a time, mixing well after each addition. Blend in vanilla; pour over crust.

- 4 cups thin peeled apple slices
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 cup chopped pecans

Toss apples with combined sugar and cinnamon. Spoon apple mixture over cream cheese layer; sprinkle with chopped pecans. Bake at 350°, 1 hour and 10 minutes. Loosen cake from rim of pan; cool before removing rim of pan. Chill. 10-12 servings.

VARIATION: Add 1/2 cup finely chopped pecans with crumbs for crust.

I received a letter on the wages paid to Beach Boys and Girls. In 1967 the children were paid \$5.00 a week to clean our streets and beaches seven days a week. Today, despite inflation, they are paid \$5.00 per week. I forwarded the letter to council.

Golf Course Concerns

A letter was received concerning those "who monopolize the course by placing numerous balls into the rack to 'hold' a spot at the first tee for comrades who have not yet arrived". Family Reunion

On Sunday, August 2nd, 1992 a Muldrew family reunion was held at Rev. Fraser Muldrew's cottage on Eighth Avenue.

The Muldrew family started coming to Victoria Beach in the summer of 1927 when Alf and Jessie Muldrew rented Sleepy Hollow at 314 Third Avenue next door to Jessie's brother, Dr. Jim McTavish. They rented this cottage again in the summer of 1928 and in 1929 they had a cottage of their own constructed at 315 Second Ave. directly behind the McTavish cottage. The family paid \$200.00 for the lot and \$800.00 for the cottage.

Over the years the families grew until there were eight McTavish children and six Muldrew children. What fun with so many children to play with, from arrival on the train as soon as school was over until departure after the Labour Day weekend.

In those days, there was a "Family Day" on Patricia Beach with prizes for sandcastle building, best tan, etc. We took great delight one summer in winning the largest family on the beach contest.

Dad was an avid golfer and would golf 18 holes every day, except Sunday, for the whole summer. As soon as the boys were old enough he took them golfing. Fraser, Jim and to varying degrees, the other boys, still retain this interest in golf. I remember that as kids we could play a round on Kids Day for 10 cents and a second round for five cents. We always played the second round.

When the children grew up, three of them, Jim, Lucille and Don, moved to other parts of Canada but Fraser, Milt and Cecil now have their own cottages at the beach. Two of Cecil's children also have cottages here.

The reunion at Red's Roost, appropriately named because Fraser, Marion and all their children have red hair, saw relations from Charlottetown, P.E.I. to the Queen Charlotte Island getting together for fun, swimming, eating and a very good time reliving old memories and creating new ones. All six of Alf and Jessie's children were able to come as well as most of their children and grandchildren along with the accompanying husbands, wives and sweethearts.



The Origin of the Parking Lot

The history of the coming of the highway and the parking lot of Victoria Beach is quite interesting. The two are in many ways tied into one resident of the community.

When John Aitah returned to Victoria Beach after military service in the Second World War, he was much attuned to problems of the developing fur ranching industry. Ranchers were unable to compete on a large scale because the sandy trails connecting Winnipeg to Victoria Beach were largely inaccessible. This posed problems in transporting necessary supplies. In addition, the lack of hydro power made life extremely hard for ranchers wanting to improve production. John felt that if he served on council, he could make the road development and hydro availability a reality. With this platform, he was elected to council in 1947.

Some of summer community felt a road would allow the invasion of traffic and greatly disturb the tranquility of life at a summer resort they had grown to love and cherish. After four years on council, John was repeatedly defeated on presentation of his ideas and came to realize that the only way he would get support for his proposals would be to convince other residents in favour of road development to run for council. After the election of 1951, the Rural Municipality of Victoria Beach consisted of two councillors and the reeve who favored road development. The advocates approached the Premier of Manitoba, the Minister of Highways and the Minister of Municipal Affairs.

The engineers from the Department of Highways sent to examine the project determined that costs for grading and paving across the marsh connecting Albert Beach to Victoria Beach would amount to \$60,000.00. The municipal budget was only \$20,000.00. The provincial government agreed to contribute \$40,000.00 towards road development if the municipality would contribute \$20,000.00 over the next five years at \$4,000.00 per year.

The first signs of road construction by way of dragline across the marsh began in the summer of 1952. Large lobby groups opposing construction met with the premier and ministers responsible. When the provincial government became aware of such widespread opposition, steps were taken to halt further road construction.

John, frustrated with this sudden turn around of events, went to the summer community and tried to convince those that feared invasion that they were protected by provincial statute allowing Victoria Beach exclusive rights to control traffic. Unconvinced, they argued that there was no accommodation for an influx of vehicles. After much deliberation, John proposed to the Victoria Beach Company the idea of a parking lot outside the beach community. The Beach Company was unwilling to provide such a facility and sided with the wishes of the summer residents. The municipality had no budget for such a capital undertaking. John then proposed the following idea:

1) John Aitah would absorb the entire cost of developing a parking lot and would be fully responsible for its complete establishment including tree removal, roads, office, garage, fencing, signs and out-house facilities.

2) John Aitah would build on Beach Company property outside the summer community, lease the land and return to the beach company 25% of all revenues with rates established by the Beach Company.

The Beach Company approved this plan and by-laws were passed by council. Tree clearing and parking lot development began in the spring of 1953 with full operation by the following year. Road construction resumed with the improvements being made from Grand Beach to Victoria Beach.

The original parking lot consisted of the first five rows. The first expansion which gave the parking lot eight rows occurred in the early sixties after train travel ceased. By 1970 rows 9 and 10 were added. Rows 11, 12 and 13 were added in 1976 and an overflow was built in 1991.

Kevin Aitah, grand nephew of John, now operates the parking lot. Victoria Beach continues to attract vacationers by its serenity and natural beauty and above all, its freedom from the invasion of traffic in the summer months.

The Late Life of "Folly II"

Few witnessed the push-off of an old low slung white fiber glass canoe from the precincts of the Yacht Club on August 5th. It carried Lionel with his seventy year old grandma, steering to navigate choppy water, the skills for which Lionel was not yet completely prepared. Grandma, Hilda Morrish, whose broken wrist finally healed sufficiently to tackle the voyage, surveyed the rotting birch thwarts, pondering that replacement would probably involve shiny aluminum. Folly II was purchased in 1969.

The voyage to Hillside spit was uneventful and Folly slid quickly up the sand. Gran missed the pelicans who had retreated as a noisy motorized boat issued from the marsh. Walking west and away from the invading noise of the boat, Gran watched a sandpiper shepherding two young who were scavenging lunch at the water's edge. Memories flooded in of fording that same channel on Ajax, cantering down the sands in and out of lapping waves.

To pass the torch becomes so important to grants who maintain vintage cottages, struggling to keep up repairs often invigorated by the invasions of young families whose time with them gives so much pleasure. The need to maintain simplicity for the happiest cottage life-style is important at our beach.

Folly was returned to the rack after some repairs in a pouring rain. Will the wrens nest again under her per, undisturbed perhaps if Gran fails to paddle to Elk Island for blueberries? Dried out, Gran was back on the tennis court the next day with wonderful memories of son Allan, Alice, Lionel, Marc and the eighteen month old twins, Madelaine and Andrew, whose visit gave such great joy.
