

V.B. Trivia Challenge

The winners of this week's V.B. Trivia Challenge were Joey Daycock and Corey Tottle. Answers can be dropped off at the Store or the Moonlight Inn.

ANSWERS to last week's questions:

- The V.B. Gardening Club was established in 1947 and ran until approximately 1965. A trophy was awarded annually to the best garden.
- The Clubhouse was constructed in 1925 for the total sum of \$5,000.00.
- In 1919 (when the Council was elected) the lots were assessed at three-quarters of their market value which was approximately \$1,000.00.
- The Canadian Northern Railway constructed the railway after negotiation with the V.B. Company (despite the limited number of cottages and vacationers). The first train arrived at Victoria Beach on September 19, 1916.
- In 1954, the provincial government was persuaded to build the much-needed road to Victoria Beach. A parking lot was to be built to accommodate the traffic that would come to the area and drivers and their passengers were to be taxed to their cottages for a slight remuneration. The paved highway was completed in 1957. (Originally printed in the July 19, 1985 V.B. Herald)
- Most of Elk Island is within the Township of Victoria Beach, but because there has never been any permanent (and settlement) there has been no historical development. Elk Island was surveyed by W.J. Deans in 1917. He estimated it to be two miles long and one mile wide. He reported that it was covered with thick groves of jackpine, poplar, balsam, spruce, hirsch and tamarack. The soil, like Victoria Beach, was found to be of light clay loam and unsuitable for agriculture. He mentioned that there were no minerals of any economic value and that game was scarce and any subsistence way of life would be impractical. He further mentioned that raspberries and blueberries were plentiful during their season.
- Victoria Beach has an altitude ranging from 713 to 750 feet above sea level. The highest point is located at the golf course.
- Sean Brown was seen last spring nationwide on the Arsenio Hall show (front row and centre) getting down to the rap music of Ice-T.
- The only Crown land remaining in Victoria Beach is located in the northern portion of Victoria Beach. It is used in the summer as a Bible camp. This land is swampy in many places. (Courtesy of Fred Greengrass.)
- The Victoria Beach Honor Roll signifying the sacrifices to our country's duty has 305 names inscribed on it.
In 1946 when the Roll was unveiled "the Rev. Wm. Steenson who had a bitter experience in the First World War, and was severely wounded, delivered the oration. He said that from all he had read the Second World War was similar to the First Great War, in that it gave Canadians the opportunity to display the indomitable courage which has brought them fame all around the world. Victoria Beach had its share in the glory of battle and in the determination of its men and women to see that the tyrants of Germany, Italy and Japan should be crushed completely, and the doctrine they preach should cease to influence mankind. It was fitting and proper that this community should honour these

heroic men and women." (Reprinted from the July 6th, 1946 Victoria Beach Herald)

I believe any pet owner, or person with any compassion would have appreciated the situation and waited several minutes. In any event I have not yet seen a case of poison ivy prove fatal if not treated for fifteen minutes.

From Each Generation

As the Summer of '93 slides past midpoint and begins to carve out its definition in our memories, it is worthy noting that the inclement weather only contributes to the magic of the Beach. George Cartrell never allows the wind, rain, sleet or hail to deter a few hours on the Golf Course, one of our prize-worthy cornerstones. Countless hundreds (if not thousands) of us hacked our first rounds with masbie niblicks here. Not enough has been said to deify John Evans for his efforts since taking it over. His considerable improvements have been the greatest contribution since its construction. We all owe John deserving thanks for generations to come.

As harsh winters bred a hardy race of early Manitobans, rain at the Beach should bring out strength of arctic character in all its inhabitants. Hearing Keith Burr's bagpipes through the woods brings tears not only to the eyes of descendent Scots. All appreciative listeners benefit now from thousands of hours of his patient practising on rainy days. Many other musicians should be encouraged to bring their portable instruments to the Lake. Manitoba has one of the highest acclaimed concentrations of musically gifted people in North America and further contributions of any melodious sound, especially singing, would be a bonus.

If there is a sound engineer amongst us, please mix a tape of our bird calls, waves and children in the raspberry patches. These sounds blended with classical music are a very lucrative market with Pacific Coast culture buffs. It would be especially welcome relief on a mid-January day to listen to a tape of the summer of '93 at Victoria Beach.

Nancy-Lou Ateah captures the beach in water colours as well as brings out latent artistic skills in several summer residents. Suzanne Wiebe has been an exceptional student. Betty MacRae has done marvellous water colours for many years with impressive results of famous Beach landmarks. More artists in all mediums should be encouraged to produce inside on rainy days, recording Victoria Beach's unique qualities. Rosamunde Pilcher's best seller "The Shell Seekers" epitomizes the water colour artists of a small English resort village at the turn-of-the-century. Paintings stored in the attic now fetch hundreds of thousands of dollars at auction.

Cloudy weather often provides a decent excuse to undertake cottage maintenance. New and more vibrant gardens (including vegetables) are sprouting up all over and applause is offered to all who have made substantial improvements. With generous topsoil, an agreeable mixture of sun and rain give results.

Twenty year roof tiles and coats of paint also need to be applied periodically to the cottage. One can either repeat a trusted hue or experiment. The Grover/Thomas residence 311 Fifth is sporting a new Welsh Green which is the envy of the Beach this summer. In the past, major accomplishments like Harold Martin's freestanding stone wall at 337 First would make any Scottish country Earl envious. He also carved the VB "no-cars" bylaw in the Manitoba Provincial Statutes.

New cottages seem to be exploding onto the landscape. As with the most picturesque, culturally homogeneous and historically enduring villages of Europe, maintaining simplicity, modest proportions and blending in with nature should be the rule of thumb. Mr. Larsen nailed the sturdy Icelandic cathedral

ceiling into many of our cottages. We each own a tiny, personal museum just by maintaining them.

Tampering with nature is surely undoing the very best of what Victoria Beach offers, such as reshaping rock formations on Patricia and Alexander Beaches. It took a million years for the Agassiz glaciers to carve out Lake Winnipeg's basin, grinding up granite, shale, limestone and quartz to give up one of the world's finest beaches. Meddling with this will not save wooden staircases. The "big rock" on King Edward (off which I dove as a kid) had its 20 ton mass tossed 40 yards by the ice one winter. Let nature set down her stones, carve out the half moon sandy shores and thin the forest.

Those who have preserved our summer homes the longest can recite all the stories. Many of our parents and grandparents have contributed quietly to the continuation of this heritage. Canon Gill produced his own poetic justification for Victoria Beach many decades ago. Bill Harrison followed in his footsteps with many memorable sermons. Murray McLandress and Gordon Wiswell have brought generation of joy not only to their families but all of us lucky enough to have been exposed to their kind, caring manners. Olive Hanley insures newcomers are quickly patched into the VB quilt as participants, not bystanders. Who will follow them?

While legends such as Peter Ateah pass, memories of their wonderful, gentle affinity with fellow man and nature are a lesson to everyone. All the grandmas and grandpas, parents, aunts and uncles are the historical links which have kept Victoria Beach unique. Even with our surface idiosyncrasies, deep down inside us all rests a soul of existence which we share here. Subliminally it unites us, while keeping tune with the beating waves and the rain pattering down the roofs.

The Haven, at 301 Sunset, built in 1922 by Arden and Nell Trickey, has seen a few changes in 71 years. It was enjoyed by their only child, Helen, until at age 8 her mother died and the cottage was sold. The family also sold 1184 Wolsley Ave. where the neighbours jointly fought to save the old elm tree in the middle of the road.

Several years later, Helen accompanied some friends visiting "301" on the train one summer and asked the new owner to call her if she decided sell some time. And Jessie Innes did just that.

Meantime, Helen and Ron MacIntosh with four young children had just moved into a new house on Portage Ave. (away out in the country and 41 years later we're still there). We needed a cottage like a toothache! However, Helen endeavoured to show off its charms to her doubting husband. After all, Ron had spent summers at Clear Lake, a bit different from Victoria Beach.

So they boarded the CNR ride on those old, dirty coaches, only to find the choice for a quick lunch, the Inn on Pier Road, had burned down. A plate of pork and beans at the Moonlight Inn didn't go over well, either.

Once inside the old cottage, however, Ron knew he'd had it! So, the inevitable happened. The MacIntoshes bought back the 30-year-old family cottage.

Sandy and the four boys enjoyed summers here while Ron continued as a teacher, taking courses. About 12:30 noon when the whistle sounded, everyone gathered on the station platform, whether you were meeting someone on the train or not. Remember the kids hollering Free Press and Tribune and the wagons and trucks waiting to transfer your trunks and suitcases? The boys remember the excitement of putting pennies on the track and recovering them after they'd been flattened by the engine. The real thrill for them was the ride they got back to the "Y". And apparently it was cool to walk barefoot on the cinders without flinching.

Ron re-screened and reroofed until the cottage got to be old and tired. So, in 1971, Jack Jonsson took down the old one and built a new cottage for us. It's even 22 years old already! Later, a sleeping cabin was built when seven Portuguese carpenters arrived one morning at 9:00 a.m. We all watched and helped to lift the walls. The neighbours were very relieved when the job was completed at 3:00 p.m.

In the late '50s the Yacht Club was formed. Ron was one of the first sailors and still enjoys the weekend races, in his fourth boat. He started with an Enterprise; then built part of a Fireball; then built the entire second one; then got a Laser when crew were no longer available. Ron and Helen took turns working for the Yacht Club and the Community Club.

Gary and Maxine with Kirsten and Garrett (2), as well as Ted and Pat with Andrea and Ian, continue to visit the old folks. Ron and Tammy with Ron (27), Scott, Shauna and Kerry, have their own cottage on Fifth. Laurie and Lynda are at Lot 13, Catastrophe Lake. And so it goes!

We're so lucky here to be so close to town and also to have so many volunteers to operate the kid's activities. And the safety feature without the cars is a unique blessing. Former cottagers who return for a visit always say, "How nice, the beach hasn't changed!" And to that we add - AMEN!
